## B. W. Wells Stewardship Award Mason Wallace Park Project Summary

On October 12, 2022 we received the happy news that our application was approved. Our group lost no time scheduling a meeting to celebrate and get to work.

Prior to our October 23<sup>rd</sup> meeting, Dave Molinaro and Stephen James were in contact with Mecklenburg County Parks and Rec staff who were excited to assist us in this project. They marked out the plot, brought in soil amendments, requested a utility check, and tilled the soil so we would have fertile ground for our new native plants.

Our application originally proposed using a native plant nursery in western NC; however, transportation for getting the plants to our site was problematic. After receiving several suggestions from other committee members, Stephen James contacted Lisa Tompkins (It's Elemental Landscape Design) at Carolina Heritage Nursery in Waxhaw. With a few minor revisions, she was able to provide and deliver all the plants we needed for the project. All plants were currently available except the Asclepias Tuberosa (Butterfly Weed), which will be delivered in the spring. A plot map is attached.



We scheduled our planting date for Saturday, November 19<sup>th</sup>, and notified volunteers of the upcoming event. Again MCP&R provided valuable help in getting mulch delivered to our site as well as placing several large decorative stones in the plot.

A few days prior to planting, Dave Molinaro, using Stephen James's well devised planting diagram, put flags where each plant should go and set up the staging area for delivery. He also prepared legends for volunteers to match the letters on the flags with specific plants. Lisa Tompkins, of Carolina Heritage Nursery, was there bright and early on planting day. We promptly unloaded the truck and began working.

We had eleven volunteers who were there to help all or part of the morning, and we got 89 native plants snuggled into their new home and mulched for the winter. Hopefully, they will be sending down roots so we will have a great display next Spring. We will also plant the nine additional Butterfly Weed plants at that time. 


# Native Plants take root in Mason Wallace Park



Mason Wallace Park welcomes the first of three Native Plants Plots. The idea for the plots sprang after the <u>park's revitalization celebration</u> in May of this year. And **Mason Wallace Park Advocates (MWPA)** set out to make it happen.

**Stephen James** designed the landscape plan for the 125'x10' area to include nearly 100 individual plants—across 11 different species—as well as several small boulders. This first plot is a sun-loving site, stretching along the left side of the back parking lot. MWPA worked with **Lisa Tompkins**, owner of **Carolina Heritage Nursery**, to source the species they desired.

"Mecklenburg County Park and Recreation's Horticulture Manager, **Phillip Clarkson**, has been so supportive of the project," said **Dave Molinaro**, leader of MWPA. The County helped prepare the site for planting and also provided mulch.



With the site and materials ready, MWPA rallied volunteers for a morning work session on Saturday, November 19. Lisa delivered a truckload of healthy plants,

and in under two hours, the volunteers got all of the plants in the ground and mulched.





### The First 3-Year Life Cycle

If you go by the park, you will see a large area of mulch with boulders and a series of tiny flags sticking up. Watch your step! Those plant babies are in the ground. During the first year, they'll sleep. In Year 2, they'll creep. And in Year

3, they'll leap. The plot design above details the species' scientific names and locations, while the collage below shows how the matured plants' blooms may

look in their future glory.



#### Funding for the first plot

MWPA secured a grant from the <u>B.W. Wells Stewardship Fund</u>, a North Carolina Native Plant Society (NCNPS) program that supports community projects like native plant garden installations and habitat restorations. (NCNPS also helped fund Charlotte Wildlife Stewards' planting of native wetland plants at the Chantilly Ecological Sanctuary a few years back.) We will keep you informed of future opportunities to contribute time and treasure to Plots #2 and #3.
